High Risk Foot Service

What is the high risk foot service?

The service takes care of people who have slow healing, open or infected wounds on their feet.

We also look after people who have had foot surgery because of an infection.

You will see by a Podiatrist who will recommend expert treatment for your feet.

Who should come to the high risk foot service?

If you've had a sore or ulcer on your foot for over a month that isn't improving, you should visit the high-risk foot service.

Does the service look after other feet problems?

No. If you have corns, ingrown toenails, or foot pain, your family doctor will give you other treatment options through the Medicare system.

How do I make an appointment?

The first step is to make an appointment to see your family Doctor.

After looking at the wound on your foot, your Doctor will decide if you need to come to the high risk foot service.

For you to be seen at the high risk foot service, your Doctor will complete a referral form for you. This can be done online or as a written form.

Once you have the referral you can call the service that is closest to you and make an appointment.



Checking your Sensation

What happens at my appointment?

You will see a Podiatrist who will:

- Check the blood flow and sensation or feeling in your feet.
- Treat your wound or ulcer.

The Podiatrist might also:

- Refer you to a circulation doctor if there are concerns about the blood flow to your feet.
- Refer you to a doctor for further treatments such as antibiotics and other tests.

The Podiatrist will talk to you on how to improve your footwear and insoles to prevent future wounds. If needed, they can refer you to a footwear specialist called a Pedorthist.
